

How has the Christian message survived 2000 years?

Core Concept:

Kingdom of God

KEY VOCABULARY:

Apostle: Means 'one who is sent'. Usually refers to the first 12 disciples and St Paul.

Creed: A statement of belief. Comes from the Latin word 'credo', meaning 'I believe'.

Evangelism: Telling others the Good News of the Christian message.


Missionary: Someone who travels away from their home country or culture to tell or show others the love of God.

Persecution: Hostility and illtreatment, especially because of race or political or religious beliefs.

The Great Commission:

Jesus' final words to his disciples in Matthew 28:18-10. He tells them to go out into the world and make disciples of others, baptising them and teaching them. He promises to be with them always.

The Book of Acts: The Book of Acts records the start of the Church. It was written by Luke, the same Luke that wrote the Gospel. He was writing to Theophilus, who was probably a high-ranking Roman official. Following his resurrection on Easter Sunday, Jesus made numerous appearances to his followers. In Acts 1:1-8 Jesus tells his followers to stay in Jerusalem to await the gift of the Holy Spirit. When this happened, they would receive God's power to share the Christian message.







The original writers of the Old Testament wrote in Hebrew and the New Testament writers wrote in Greek. Christians believe it is important for people to have access to the Bible as they believe that God speaks to people through his word. Organisations such as The Bible Society and Wycliffe Bible Translators are committed to making the Bible available for people to read in their own language.

The Apostles Creed: The Early Church needed a clear statement of beliefs. The creed provided information to be taught to new Christians and was to be learnt by heart. In 2000 years, there have only been two important creeds which the Church has used widely in its worship; The Nicene Creed and The Apostles Creed.
